

Bonfire Night

Bonfire Night is celebrated on 5th November.
It is also known as Guy Fawkes Night or Fireworks Night.

It remembers how a man called Guy Fawkes tried to blow up some important buildings in London. He did it because he wanted to change the way the country was being run.



The 'Guy'

The plot didn't work and Guy Fawkes was caught. Even though some people agreed with Guy Fawkes, there were also lots of people who didn't. Some people celebrated by lighting bonfires all over London. Soon, the whole country was joining in.

Today

Today, Guy Fawkes Night is still celebrated with bonfires. A lot of people now just call it Bonfire Night. Bonfire Night can be celebrated in people's back gardens or at organised events for families. Sometimes you can buy food there, like hot dogs and jacket potatoes.

Other Bonfire Nights

In parts of Northern Ireland, Bonfire Night is also celebrated on another day for something entirely different. Eleventh Night celebrations happen on 11th July and are nothing to do with Guy Fawkes.

Here are some of the fireworks you might see.

Rocket

It flies high and explodes with a big bang.

Roman Candle

It shoots out stars with lots of noise and colour.

Catherine Wheel

It spins and makes whizzy noises.

Fountain

It has lots of sparks that last for a long time. It is not as loud as other fireworks.

Sparkler

You hold a sparkler on a stick. It gives off lots of little sparks.

Mine

It fires coloured stars into the sky with a loud bang.

Be Safe with Sparklers!

- Don't put them in your pocket.
- Never pick one up from the floor.
- Make sure you are with an adult.
- Don't wave more than one at a time.
- Wear gloves.
- Hold them at arm's length.
- Put them in water after they go out (they can still burn you).



Soon, the whole country was joining in. It became known as Gunpowder Treason Day or Guy Fawkes Night.

Today, Guy Fawkes Night is still celebrated with bonfires; a lot of people now just call it Bonfire Night. Bonfire Night can be celebrated in people's back gardens or at organised events. These are often fun, family events. Food is served, such as toffee apples, hot dogs or jacket potatoes.

Other Bonfire Nights

In some parts of Northern Ireland, Bonfire Night is also the name for the Eleventh Night celebrations that happen on 11th July. They are nothing to do with Guy Fawkes.

Here are some of the fireworks you might see.

Rocket

It flies high and then explodes with a big bang.

Roman Candle

Roman candles are lots of little balls that shoot out stars. They can make all sorts of colours.

Mine

The mine fires coloured stars into the sky with a loud bang.

Fountain

Fountains shoot out a shower of sparks. They are not as loud as some other fireworks.

Sparkler

Sparklers are fireworks that you can hold on a stick. They give off lots of little sparks.

Catherine Wheel

This spinning firework often makes crackly, whizzy noises as it whirls around.

Be Safe with Sparklers!

- Don't put them in your pocket.
- Never pick one up from the floor.
- Make sure you are with an adult.
- Don't wave more than one at a time.
- Wear gloves.
- Hold them at arm's length.
- Put them in water after they go out (they can still burn you).

Bonfire Night

Bonfire Night is celebrated every year on 5th November.

Also known as Guy Fawkes Night or Fireworks Night, it remembers how, in 1605, a man called Guy Fawkes tried to blow up the Houses of Parliament. Along with other members of the Gunpowder Plot, he placed explosives beneath the House of Lords in London as he didn't like the way King James I was running the country.



Other Bonfire Nights

Bonfire Night is also another name for the Eleventh Night celebrations in parts of Northern Ireland, which happen on 11th July and are nothing to do with Guy Fawkes.



The plot failed and Guy Fawkes was caught. Even though some people agreed with Guy Fawkes, there were also lots of people who didn't. People were encouraged to celebrate the Gunpowder Plot's failure. To begin with, bonfires were lit all over London and within ten years, the whole country was joining in. It became known as Gunpowder Treason Day or Guy Fawkes Night.

Today, Guy Fawkes Night is still celebrated with bonfires but a lot of people now just call it Bonfire Night. Bonfire Night can be celebrated in people's back gardens or at organised events. These are often fun, family events where people can stand and watch. Food is usually served, such as toffee apples, hot dogs or jacket potatoes and there is nearly always a fireworks display.



This popular rhyme is from a longer poem and has been around for a very long time.

It reminds people of the day Guy Fawkes planned to blow up the Houses of Parliament.

(Treason is when someone betrays their country.)

Fountains release a shower of sparks. They are not as loud as some other fireworks and can last a long time.

Sparkler

Sparklers are small, handheld fireworks on a stick that give off lots of little sparks.

Catherine Wheel

This spinning firework often makes crackly, whizzy noises as it whirls around and around.

The King would have wanted people to be on his side and expect them to celebrate the Gunpowder Plot's failure. 
